The widow is persistent. She won't give up. She keeps asking the judge for justice, even though it is clear he's not interested in her case. After all, he is an unjust judge who has no fear of God and no respect for people. The pleadings of a mere widow cut no ice with him.

But she won't leave him alone. She won't desist. The woman wants justice and she's determined to get it. Maybe she's being cheated out of her inheritance, or is being abused in some way, but whatever the reason she is utterly convinced she has right on her side.

And then the judge gives in, not because he is interested in justice or moved with compassion, but because he's afraid of her. When he says that the widow will 'beat me down,' what the Greek text literally says is: 'She will hit me under the eye.' In other words, the judge who neither fears God nor respects people grants her request because he is scared the widow will give him a black eye.

The message of the parable is this: prayer isn't simply saying pious words. Like the persistent widow, we can't be content merely to pray for whatever it is we seek, we must actively seek it. ■

REFLECT

any years ago, a Redemptorist colleague offered three tips on how to pray that I have never forgotten.

The first is this: pray the way you can – not the way you can't. There are lots of different ways to pray and different forms of prayer. Use the method that suits you best. Some pray the rosary. Some recite prayers they learned by rote as children. Others like meditation or lectio divina or eucharistic adoration or spiritual reading.

The point is, there is no right or wrong way to pray. All that is important is that you do pray. So, pray the way you can – not the way you can't.

Second tip: say what you mean. In other words, be honest with God. Honesty and frankness are essential in any relationship, and it's the same with our relationship with God. If you feel angry with God, let it out. If you're full of joy, let it show. If you feel

anxious or upset about something, express it. If you feel bored, express that, too.

The Book of Job is a wonderful example of honesty in prayer. Job feels so upset, bewildered, angry over the undeserved misfortune that has befallen him, and he lets God know it in no uncertain terms. He is not afraid to tell God exactly how he feels. In Gethsemane, Jesus, full of raw emotion, cries out to God in his pain and anguish. He doesn't hold back. The Book of Psalms contains prayers for almost every occasion. So, tip two: Say what you mean. Whatever it is you want to say to God, say it.

Third tip: mean what you say. There are two aspects to meaning what you say. First, to really think about what you're saying. There is a danger when we pray that we go through the motions. We rattle off a prayer without really focusing on the words. It's easy to get distracted. It happens to me all the time. I start to pray and before I know it, I'm planning tomorrow's work schedule or wondering about a meeting I

have that afternoon, or how well Liverpool will do in the Premier League next season.

Distractions, failure to concentrate, are a constant challenge to prayer. When it happens just refocus and get back on track.

The second aspect to this third tip is this: practise what you pray; live what you profess. When we pray the Our Father and say the words 'as we forgive those who trespass against us' – the challenge is to forgive those who trespass against us. The challenge is to do what we say, to make good what we pray.

When we gather around the Eucharistic table in praise and thanks and pledge to serve our brothers and sisters as one family united in love, then that it what we must try to do. We go from church to world to try to live what we profess. So, tip three: when you pray, mean what you say.

These three tips are easy to remember. The challenging bit is to try to put them into practice. ■



Parish Bulletin

Today, 19 October is World Mission Sunday, which is a day we offer prayer and financial support for missionaries and Churches in need all over the world.

The Vatican II Document, Ad Gentes says, "The pilgrim Church is missionary by her nature, since it is from the mission of the Son and the mission of the Holy Spirit that she draws her origin, according to the decree of God the Father." This implies that we all are involved in the mission of Christ.

A day like this reminds me of my missionary experience at St Monica Church Pusiga, Catholic Diocese of Navrongo-Bolgatanga, UER Ghana, from January 2021 to June 2025. It is in a Sahel region and the weather there can be extremely hot up to 44 degrees Celsius sometimes. Pusiga is predominantly populated by Muslims and African Traditionalists. Their major occupation is farming, and the literacy level is low as many do not see the need to go to school.

The parish Church was some miles away from other outstations, and because of bad roads, the most comfortable means to access some of the stations was by motorcycle even under the harsh weather. On many occasions, I was beaten by rain, on about four occasions, I fell from the motorcycle and once the house where I lived was burgled.

Working at Pusiga from Bawku due to a lack of accommodation was a big challenge. A few months after arriving at Bawku, a lingering tribal conflict between the Mampusi and the Kusasi tribes over who would produce the village paramount chief exploded. I witnessed first-hand this war that left many dead, some homeless and hungry. People were deserting the area for a safer place. But I was there doing the Lord's work.

The effect of this war in Bawku and the bandits' menace in Burkina Faso, which shares a Boundary with the Pusiga district, left us with a lot of war victims to care for with limited resources. My joy amidst all these challenges was that I was doing the Lord's work.

In Pusiga, being that the Church was almost abandoned because they only had access to a priest once or twice a year, there was a need to revive the faith of a few Catholics who remained through daily celebration of the Eucharist. In the need to catch them young, as the Chaplain of the children, I organized weekly Catechism for them, and on one occasion, they told me that in their school, their Islam brethren sing Arabic and asked if Catholics have our own language. That became an opportunity to teach them Latin songs. Now, they can sing almost every part of Mass in Latin.

Also, since it is an area where children are neglected and abused, I organized seminars and workshops for them, inviting experts to come and talk to them about their rights and the need to go to school.

Furthermore, I brought the young people together and had with them, the first ever Youth Week where we engaged them in a lot of activities like seminars, quiz, workshops, spiritual talks, Eucharistic Adoration, and sports. This activity gave them an opportunity to play a football match with their Muslim brethren, thereby fostering peaceful coexistence amongst them.

Howbeit, the Local Church was unable to meet the needs of missionaries in this area and those of so many people who needed help. It was through the support of the Congregation of the Mission (The Vincentians), Nigeria Province, General Curia, and other people of goodwill that this mission is sustained, and more is needed to be done.

In his encyclical Redemptoris Missio, Pope St John Paul II says, "The mission of Christ the Redeemer, which is entrusted to the Church, is still very far from completion.... " It is clear from this encyclical that we have a common responsibility towards evangelizing the entire world.

I share my mission experience for you to consider sharing in our Lord's invitation to evangelization through your generous support which helps the Holy Father to take care of the needs of the young, struggling, and persecuted Churches all over the world.

There is a saying that, 'Some go on missions by going, and others by giving'
